



Kenny's story

In November 2016, a severely neglected and emaciated Pakistani Mastiff, known as a Bully Kutta, was found abandoned on the streets near our rescue. His name was **Kenny**, and he was in an appalling state: dangerously underweight, covered head to foot in Sarcoptic mange, and suffering from illegally cropped ears, a cruel and painful procedure banned in the UK.

At just 18 months old, Kenny had already experienced intense abuse and hardship. He was so close to death that his survival was uncertain. But Kenny made it to Pennine Pen Animal Rescue, where our team immediately began his treatment with care and dedication. Although he could not be rehomed due to his ongoing health issues, Kenny found his forever home with us.

Kenny lived the rest of his life at the rescue, where he became something truly special. With his gentle nature and striking appearance, Kenny captured the hearts of our staff, volunteers, and the local community alike. He became a much-loved ambassador for the rescue, often recognised on his daily walks and featured in both local and national media.

Despite ongoing allergies and conditions requiring regular veterinary care, Kenny enjoyed a happy and fulfilled life until he sadly passed away in April 2021. He is a permanent part of our story and a symbol of everything we believe in, compassion, commitment, and second chances.



Robyn's story

Robyn originally came to us from a pound and was rehomed but sadly had to come back to us as her owner was extremely poorly. She was with us for nearly a year before she found her forever home.

Robyn needed a special home, she was very mistrusting of new people so needed a quiet, adult only home with minimal visitors.

Robyn was also reactive to dogs on walks, but we mixed her with certain dogs at the rescue and decided she could live with another dog with successful introductions. Once Robyn knows and trusts you, she is a very loving, sweet girl.

Eventually a family came forward who were just right for her and she has now been adopted.

In the meantime we were able to be her home from home, which we could only do thanks to our supporters.



Woody's Story

Woody was another male cat left unneutered fending for himself on the streets.

Because of this he has sadly tested positive for FIV which is something cats get when fighting/mating.

Before coming to us Woody must have been involved in an accident, his tail was broken high up so had to have it amputated and he sometimes has little accidents when he is asleep (small leaks of urine). Because of this he required a special home with an understanding owner.

Luckily he didn't have to wait long to find one however and Woody, now named Huggy, is doing extremely well in his new home and loving life.

Rose's story

We noticed a cat sitting outside the main entrance to our rescue. When we went out to investigate, it was immediately clear she was in urgent need of help.

She was extremely emaciated, clearly very weak and covered in faeces. Her neck and back marked with multiple wounds.

She was rushed straight to the vets for emergency assessment. Her overall body condition was extremely poor. She had been severely underfed and was dangerously underweight. She was given medication for tummy issues, and a full panel of blood tests has been taken to rule out any underlying conditions.



Her wounds were clipped and cleaned so the vets could properly assess them. The cause is unclear, but there is a heartbreaking possibility that something may have been spilled or deliberately poured onto her.

After the initial shock of finding her, we checked our CCTV to see how she entered the rescue.

What we saw was deeply upsetting. She did not wander in.

A couple pulled up in our car park across the main road. They let her out of the car and made her follow them across a busy road with continuous traffic. They then picked her up and pushed her through our main gate like a letter through a post-box before driving away.

She was discarded. Left weak, starving and injured.

Despite everything she has endured, she is the sweetest little soul. She craves love. She leans into every touch. She has shown nothing but trust towards us. It never stops amazing us how resilient and forgiving animals can be, even after such neglect.

Rose thankfully recovered enough to find a home and is now happy and settled with her new family.

Rio's Story
